
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Discovering GIS And ArcGIS

The chapter on address location taught me all I needed to know to help build client based maps for a nonprofit in town that provides basic needs and housing to persons in need. Each chapter has subset boxes providing more detailed information behind the point-and-clicking of GIS. You're not just going to be a monkey making maps, the book provides some rounded introduction into GIScience theory, which is crucial. you're building a course, I'd recommend this as a tool for building and constructing labs.
