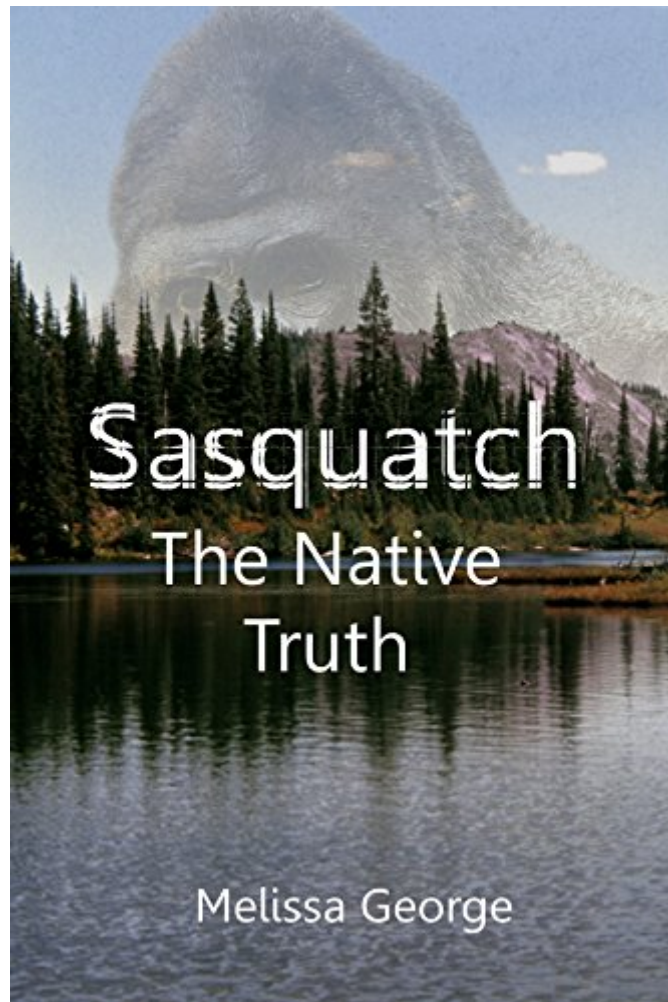


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# Sasquatch The Native Truth

I have read many books on Bigfoot, since the mid 70s. I've read stories that portray it as a noble half human, half animal. And I have read books that describe it as a violent monster. This is a new twist. If it's real, my heart goes out to this family, specially Rain. A very moving story. A must read for anyone interested in the possible existence of Bigfoot.

The native truth this story is trying to tell is that sasquatch is not the shy, peaceful creature the Finding Bigfoot shows portray, but that they are violent and dangerous. The author's family lives in a

house her father made by hand in the mountains with felled trees, which he turned into lumber. They live off the land and their gardens, but every evening as the sun sets they are sheperded inside of their house by their parents when the mountain predators come out to hunt. The author's idyllic childhood is violently rendered asunder when she and her sister finally have their own frightening face-to-face encounter, they become bigfoot witnesses, when a nine foot sasquatch steps out of the shadows and walks off with one of their beloved dogs. The two girls run for their lives, but the older sister finds her horse killed and torn apart on the trail while her younger sister mysteriously disappears only to be found later by their father and their uncle's search party. She and her younger sister are never the same again. I liked the story, which was simple and matter-of-factly narrated by the older sister. I didn't like the editing, which detracted from the story, otherwise I would give this e-book 4 stars. The older sister's view of sasquatch is that they are an animal and a violent predator, which like a mountain lion is not to be trusted nor can be fed and habituated, because sasquatches (animals) are violently driven to survive by nature.

A well written book about the dangers of some Sasquatch. I really enjoyed the book and read it in one sitting. The truth is that there are some very dangerous Sasquatch out there. But that is just like humans.....some are very bad and some are very good. Please don't believe all Sasquatch are mean killers. I can say, I don't blame this author at all about being angry and devastated. She had some horrible things happen to her family and animals. She has every right to write a book and warn people. I would have done the same. But please know that there are good Sasquatch that like people and some simply want to be left alone. I suspect that the Sasquatch that did this was probably killed by other Sasquatch. They do not like attention drawn to them and their children. If a rogue or unstable Sasquatch hurts a person, that Sasquatch is usually killed. Whether or not someone shot at them or one of their family like this authors father did. I wish peace to all involved.

I would like to thank the author for having the courage to share this personal experience. Read this book if you have any interest in sasquatch or bigfoot. I have investigated interactions in N Idaho similar to the author's. This really happens and people live (or don't, in the worst cases) traumatized for the rest of their lives. People need to understand the complexity of interacting with these forest 'people.' It is NOT always positive and can be very dangerous!

This is a short book. I read it in just a few hours. As someone who has read a lot about Sasquatch, I still found this interesting and quite suspenseful. However I had increasing difficulty believing the

story. I kept reacting as with fictional horror movies, where someone does something so obviously stupid and contrary to common sense. It seemed they just kept putting themselves in danger after repeated incidences that had frightened them previously. One scary incident would have been enough for me. In the end I concluded it was in whole or in part fiction. Still worth reading.

I can see this being one of those books that some people will think is true and others will not. My own feeling is that it is quite true and that what we are getting is a first hand account of someone's experience living in an area where there are sasquatch. It is a relatively short story, but I was riveted from the beginning. The author tells her story in a way that makes you feel that you are right there. I don't want to give any more away than I have with my title heading - But if you have any interest in the subject of sasquatch, you'll definitely want to read this woman's experience. I give her credit for being willing to come forward with her story. I feel she is trying to do people a service. This is a side of sasquatch many would rather not even consider. But it should not be discounted, dismissed, or ignored.

The ending of this book was shocking. It was a really great story. I just wish it was longer and that the person's parents would open up and tell even more of this scary story. This needs a second book.

Oh My Heavens! This story is the most amazing story about the Bigfoot encounter I have ever read. From a Native American standpoint of a family that had to learn to live with them in their reservation next to a forest. From the first sentence I was hooked, as the story tells the life of a woman brought up on a reservation. How what the elders think these things are that then is etched into Tribal Lineage that's forbidden to speak about due to becoming cursed. How ignorance is not bliss in what happens to two young girls when they are not told the truth about the Giants in the forest. What stands out is what they believed they were doing In feeding them daily, to then see what happens when you stop. How this family was then traumatized puts it lightly, in an outcome that still today leaves its ugly emotional scar on one family member. Told in first person view which puts you visually there. This true story is by far one of the most moving, frightening, suspenseful, stories you will ever ever read. One that will stay with you to remember, forever!

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
